Programs for families, kids, middle schoolers, and teens are presented at the Guggenheim Museum in conjunction with the exhibitions [Giacometti](#) and [One Hand Clapping](#).

FOR FAMILIES

Second Sunday Family Tours

Sundays, June 10, August 12, and September 9, 10:30 am–12 pm

Families with children ages 5 and up

On the second Sunday of every month, the Guggenheim offers family-oriented tours that incorporate conversation and creative hands-on gallery activities while exploring the exhibitions on view. These museum educator-led tours are organized around a single theme and highlight artworks on view from the Guggenheim's permanent collection and special exhibitions.

June 10: Off the Wall

Explore sculptures, installations, and other works of art that do not hang on the wall.

August 12: Friends and Family

Discover how artists are inspired by the people close to them.

September 9: The Right Stuff?

Investigate how artists' choices of material impact their work.

Virtual Reality Family Tour and Workshop

June 24, 10:30 am–1 pm

For families with children 7 and up

This workshop starts with a tour of immersive art and sound installations included in the exhibition *One Hand Clapping*, focusing on how artists use technology to create innovative new works. After the tour, participants take part in a virtual and augmented reality workshop designed by the interactive studio Planeta.

July 15: A Whole New Perspective

See and draw the Guggenheim Museum from a new point of view!

July 22: Drawing with the Whole Body

Activate the senses through movement, mindfulness, and drawing practices that engage participants more fully with the art and architecture at the museum.

July 29: Looking with Lines

Explore different techniques of close looking through hands-on drawing challenges.

FOR KIDS

Summerscapes Art Camp

Monday–Friday, June 18–22, June 25–29, July 16–20, July 23–27, and July 30–August 3,

9:30 am–4 pm

Ages 8–11

These stimulating, five-day camps are led by museum educators. All sessions include explorations of the Frank Lloyd Wright–designed building and exhibitions on view, as well as individual and collaborative hands-on projects in the art studio that are carefully designed to ensure successful outcomes no matter what age your child is. Each week concludes with an exhibition to share creations with family and friends.

\$600 (includes family pass, materials, and snacks), \$500 members; \$1,100 two sessions, \$900 members. Includes art materials, snacks, a family pass, and photos documenting the program. FOR MIDDLE SCHOOLERS AND TEENS

Middle School Summerscapes Art Camp

July 16–20, 9:30 am–4 pm

Grades 6–8

Presented exclusively for middle school students, this five-day camp features discussions and activities that foster creativity and critical thinking. Each session includes guided explorations of the museum's Frank Lloyd Wright–designed building and special exhibitions, followed by hands-on, interactive workshops where campers create their own works of art. These individual and collaborative art-making projects encourage participants to experiment with various mediums and methods, including painting, sculpture, collage, and digital media. The week concludes with a mini exhibition for kids to share their creations with family and friends.

\$600 (includes family pass, materials, and snacks), \$500 members. Includes art materials, snacks, a family pass, and photos documenting the program. Registration is required at guggenheim.org/kids. Teen Course: Find the Forgery!

Eight sessions, July 30–Aug 2 and Aug 6–9, 1–4pm

Grades 9–12

Designed especially for high school students, this dynamic two-week program offers an introduction into the world of art conservation and demonstrates the application of science to art history. Guided by museum conservators, curators, and educators, young people explore the galleries, conduct hands-on work in the lab, and examine works of art in the exhibitions *Giacometti* and *One Hand Clapping*. Participants utilize close observation and scientific analysis to distinguish a forgery from an authentic work of art. The program concludes with an exhibition viewing for students and their families.

\$200, \$150 members. Financial assistance available upon request. Application fee of \$50, to be applied to tuition cost upon acceptance, otherwise refunded. Students are expected to attend all eight sessions. Space is limited. Register online by June 3, 2018, at guggenheim.org/event/teen-course-find-the-forgery.

Admission: Adults \$25, students/seniors (65+) \$18, members and children under 12 free. The Guggenheim's free app, available with admission or by download to personal devices, offers an enhanced visitor experience. The app features rich multimedia content on special exhibitions, the Guggenheim's landmark building, and artworks in the museum's permanent collection. Verbal Description guides for select exhibitions are also included for visitors who are blind or have low vision. The Guggenheim app is supported by Bloomberg Philanthropies.
